Rhetorical Analysis of Letter from Birmingham Jail. In the spring 1963, Martin Luther King was jailed due to his non-violent demonstrations against racial segregation at Birmingham. Eight of Alabama's top white religious leaders criticized his action as "unwise and untimely," and called him an "outsider.". Martin Luther King responded with his own article, "Letter from Birmingham Jail.".

Emotional Appeal in "Letter From Birmingham Jail". In his letter, King offers a rational, scholarly tone, which is tempered with religiosity and sincerity. The letter presents a rational appeal and an emotional appeal, which are united in historical allusion, Biblical reference and philosophical depth. (King)King repeatedly appeals to a shared sense of religion in his letter; he also cites Biblical examples to bolster his argument.
